

Conservation Treatment Begins on Joy Luck Restaurant Sign





In his historic 1980 proclamation, President Carter acknowledged, "From the first settlers who came to our shores, from the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength and love of the women who built America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well." He went on to assert, "Understanding the true history of our country will help us to comprehend the need for full equality under the law for all our people." Each year since then, local educators and community institutions have taken up the call to celebrate and bring awareness to women's vital contributions to history and contemporary society. MOCA is proud to have joined in the celebrations this year with the launch of **MOCA Cinema: Spotlight on Women Filmmakers**, a film fest showcasing the work of women documentary filmmakers who tell our stories, in line with this year's theme. All month long, MOCA also highlighted the life stories and work of remarkable Chinese American women—both historical and contemporary—on MOCA's social media.
